The aim of this local student conference

introduce the Decoding the Disciplines (further – DD) methodology to teachers, lecturers and students by presenting them conceptual framework of this methodology, practical examples, and to encourage students and academics to research the DD methodology and ways in which they can apply it in their own studies and teaching/learning practicum.















Conference format

Conference consisted of two parts:

Practical















Participants

- Participants of the conference represented academics from different educational sectors: teachers from gymnasium, vocational school, college as well as lecturers from University. Some of participants were bachelor and master students, working in educational institutions.
- They represented very intercultural and interdisciplinary group: teachers of orthopaedics, English philology, religion, psychology; school deputy, social worker, career counsellor, etc.

Participants accentuated the importance of institutional support in regards to seeing DD methodology not just as a part of project but, instead, as a holistic part of study process.















- Students were happy to see how this methodology encourages teachers to reflect on their practises and acknowledge that it's not students' problem only if students are stuck while learning;
- Participants were thankful that DD methodology goes into depth of learning and teaching process and searches for core problems.
- It can be an emotional bottleneck!















Our success factors ©

- Arrangement of coffee break at the same room and offering participants to have coffee and snacks during the practical/discussion part of the conference.
- Division of groups into experts and students, it allowed students to share their experiences more openly. Later they had possibility to discuss it with experts.
- Giving time for discussion.
- Giving participants some time to reflect on their own experiences.
- Allowing students to be 'creative' to present their own understanding of DD method ©
